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Poisonous Plants to Avoid



Many of us would never suspect that common garden plants can put a child's life in danger.

In a number of plants, only some parts are poisonous, such as the leaves, the seeds or the bulbs. In other plants, everything is poisonous.

Fortunately nature protects children to a large extent. The attractive leaves and berries in toxic plants taste vile enough to put off the most adventurous eater.

But we can't be too careful. Take the time to find out some of the dangers which might be hiding in your garden.

Find out if any plants in your garden are poisonous, remove them or keep children well away from them.



Arum Lily

Zantedeschia aethiopica

All parts of these common white lilies will cause burning in the mouth if eaten. Serious illness is uncommon as the burning prevents large quantities from being consumed.

Symptoms: Burning mouth, skin rash.

Castor Oil Plant

Ricinis communis

Only the chewed seeds are dangerous, however 2-3 seeds can cause death.

Symptoms: Burning mouth and throat, bloody diarrhoea 3-36 hours after ingestion, rapid and feeble pulse, muscular cramps in calves and abdomen and bluish discolouration of skin.

Deadly Nightshade

Atropa belladonna

The round purple/black berries are appealing to children and highly toxic.

Symptoms: Dry throat, thirstiness, palpitations and flushed dry skin.



Lily of the Valley

Convallaria majalis

All parts of this attractive garden plant are poisonous. The fruit are globular red berries about 12mm in diameter.

Symptoms: Nausea, vomiting, headache, an excessive flow of saliva and eventually heart failure.

Oleander

Nerium oleander

All parts of this plant, with flowers ranging from white to pink, apricot and red, are poisonous.

Symptoms: Vomiting, stomach pain, blood stained faeces, dizziness,

irregular heartbeat and unconsciousness. Death results from heart failure or respiratory paralysis.

Poinsettia

Euphorbia pulcherrima

A popular pot plant with bright red, white or yellow leaves. Has a white, milky sap.

Symptoms: The sap can cause extreme irritation to the skin and eyes. All parts are poisonous if eaten and can cause severe vomiting, purging, delirium, and can lead to death.

Rosary Bean

Abrus precatorius

The seeds of this native Australian plant are very attractive, and very poisonous. One crushed seed contains enough toxins to kill an adult.

Symptoms: Vomiting, diarrhoea, weak pulse, circulatory collapse, coma, potential death.

Mushrooms

Amanita spp. & Agaricus xanthodermus

These fungi are very common in lawns and moist areas. All parts of the fungi are poisonous. **Symptoms:** Severe abdominal pain, excessive thirst, vomiting, diarrhoea, lowered blood pressure.

White Cedar Tree

Melia azedarach

Large trees growing to heights of 30m that produce fleshy fruit. Six to eight fruits can be fatal for children. **Symptoms:** Nausea, spasms, vomiting, diarrhoea, severe thirst, cold sweats, grinding of teeth, sleepiness, paralysis, potential death.

Yellow Oleander

Thevetia spp.

All parts of this plant are poisonous, especially the kernels. One kernel can be lethal for infants. **Symptoms:** Burning sensation in the mouth, dry throat, vomiting, diarrhoea, shortness of breath, dilated pupils, slow irregular pulse followed by collapse and death in serious cases.
