Regulation 110 Ventilation and natural light

The approved providermust ensure that the indoor spaces used by children ...—

- (a) are well ventilated; and
- (b) have adequate natural light; and
- (c) are maintained at a temperature that ensures the safety and wellbeing of children.

Penalty: \$2000.

Note. A compliance direction may be issued for failure to comply with this regulation.

Regulation 113 Outdoor space – natural environment

The approved provider...must ensure that the outdoor spaces... allow children to explore and experience the natural environment eg The use of natural features such as trees, sand and natural vegetation.

Note. A compliance direction may be issued for failure to comply with this regulation.


Regulation 114 Outdoor space - shade

The Approved Provider...must ensure that outdoor spaces...include adequate shaded areas to protect children from overexposure to ultraviolet radiation from the sun.

Penalty: \$1000.

Note. A compliance direction may be issued for failure to comply with this regulation.

The Federal Government's Fair Work website https://www.fairwork.gov.au/ has a lot of simple, easy to understand information about employee entitlements as well as some useful templates. Each week we'll share information from the website. This week we're looking at Educational leader allowance.

The Fair Work Commission has <u>determined that</u> an annual Educational Leader allowance of \$4,022.05 (adjusted each year) will be paid to an employee who carries out responsibilities consistent with those of the Educational Leader regardless of whether they're employed under the *Educational Services (Teachers)* Award 2020 or the *Children's Services Award 2010*.

The Allowance is effective from 1 November 2022. The Allowance has been added to the <u>Pay and Conditions Tool</u>.

The following clause will be inserted into the Children's Services Award:

15.8 Educational Leader allowance

- a) An educational leader's allowance of \$4,022.05 per annum will be paid to an employee who is required to discharge the responsibilities of the educational leader under Regulation 118 of the Education and Care Services National Regulations 2011.
- b) Where an employee is required to act as educational leader for less than five days per week, the annual allowance prescribed by clause 15.8(a) will be payable on a pro rata basis calculated by reference to the number of days per week the employee is required to act as educational leader.

Note: The allowance prescribed in clause 15.8(a) is the same amount as the educational leader allowance prescribed by clause 19.4 of the *Educational Services (Teachers) Award 2020* and will be adjusted each year to reflect the amount set in the *Educational Services (Teachers) Award 2020*.
