
Exceeding – Critical reflections. We consider our practice from a social justice & equity perspective to ensure the wellbeing and comfort of every child. We provide clothing to children and families in need. To ensure we meet the wellbeing of families we provide food in one-off circumstances or longer if required. We assist with collection and care for children whose parents are receiving treatment. We plan activities & experiences around additional needs rather than adjusting activities.

Social justice in early childhood refers to promoting fairness, inclusivity, and equal opportunities for all children, regardless of their background, culture, ethnicity, abilities, or socioeconomic status. It recognises that each child deserves respect, dignity, and the right to thrive in a supportive and nurturing environment. Social justice aims to address and rectify societal inequities by challenging biases, stereotypes, and discrimination. It involves creating inclusive classrooms, celebrating diversity, and fostering positive relationships among children, families, and educators.

Educators should engage in self-reflection, educate themselves on social justice issues, and create a culturally responsive curriculum. They should recognise and challenge inequities, foster inclusive environments, and collaborate with families and communities. Professional collaboration and continuous reflection are important for growth. By taking these steps, educators can create an inclusive and equitable learning environment that values diversity and ensures equal opportunities for all children.

- 1. Equity mindset: Educators should cultivate an equity mindset by recognising and challenging their own biases, assumptions, and prejudices. They should reflect on how their actions, decisions, and interactions may impact children differently based on factors such as race, ethnicity, culture, ability, or socioeconomic status.
- Inclusive Environment: Creating an inclusive environment is vital. Educators can design classrooms that celebrate diversity, respect individual identities, and create a sense of belonging for all children. This includes incorporating materials, resources, and books that represent diverse cultures, abilities, and backgrounds.
- 3. Equal Opportunities: Educators should strive to provide equal opportunities for every child. Educators can learn about and integrate cultural traditions, languages, and experiences into the curriculum, fostering a sense of pride and understanding.
- 5. **Critical Reflection and Dialogue:** Educators should engage in ongoing critical reflection and dialogue, both individually and collaboratively. They can question existing practices, policies, and biases to identify areas where social justice and equity can be further promoted. Sharing experiences, insights, and strategies with colleagues can contribute to a collective commitment to social justice.
- 6. **Collaboration with Families:** Building strong partnerships with families is essential. Educators can actively involve families in decision-making processes, seeking their input and valuing their perspectives. They should engage in open and




respectful communication, involving families in discussions about their child's progress, learning goals, and any concerns or needs that may arise.
